Being a first-year head coach is hard. It's even harder in the midst of a pandemic, which is what Baylor football head coach Dave Aranda had to deal with when he took the job

in 2020. COVID-19 took away everything a firstyear head coach in a new program would need to be successful, such as practice and face-to-face interactions, which resulted in the Bears finishing with a 2-7 record.

Now in his second year with fewer restrictions, Aranda is happy just to get a chance to be closer to his

"Excited to be back and excited to be in normal spaces," Aranda said in a press conference. "It's a big difference when you're in a room and you've got the attention of everyone, and they're all focused in on you and you can kind of feel it, as opposed to, 'We're here

and everything is spaced out to such a degree that it's hard to keep that attention."

Aranda has taken advantage of being able to be closer to his team, implementing weekly team dinners and Zoom meetings with families in an effort to allow everyone to get to know one another — something the players appreciate.

"I think that's what makes a team good,"

senior wide receiver R.J. Sneed said in a press conference on Aug. 10. "When I know you more off the field than I know you on the field, then I know you've got my back on the field. So I think that's a good thing going into the season, compared to last year where we get on the field and I see a number out there, I'm like, 'Who is

that?" Aranda has also made it a point to meet with players individually so they can pick his brain.

"A couple weeks ago, I sat with Coach Aranda and just talked coverages," junior quarterback Gerry Bohanon said. "Man, when I say that he knows so much, it is unbelievable. I couldn't even grasp it all because I was just writing everything down trying to catch it. And I know when I went home later that day, I had to sit back and just read. I was like, 'Maybe I need to meet this guy a little bit more; he's very intelligent.""

Senior safety JT Woods has had similar experiences with Aranda.

"He just gets in the zone," Woods said in a press conference. "He kind of sits back, and he just dissects a play. If you really sit in a film session with him, you can really see the defensive mind that he has. It's just really amazing for me, being a defender. I just love

Junior Gerry Bohanon is ready to start as the new quarterback for Baylor after having competed for the spot against sophomore Jacob Zeno and freshman Blake Shapen. Bohanon spent most of his time at Baylor as a backup to previous quarterback Charlie Brewer. Now that it's his time to shine, Bohanon said he has continued to work on his game.

"I'm working on everything," Bohanon

"I'd like to see Gerry get into a rhythm," Aranda said in his press conference. "I'd like to see Gerry gain confidence. I'd like to see him take control of the team on a Saturday night ... and full confidence that he's going to do that, and excited to see him do that."

Football Preview——

Ebner ready for big year

Senior running back Trestan Ebner has seen it all. For the last five years, he has put his skills on display time and time again, and he has consistently improved.

After a 2019 campaign in which he put up great numbers as a pass-catching running back, Ebner was set to go berserk in the 2020 season. Amid the down year with COVID-19 and other team issues, he did not thrive to the extent that

The plans for the upcoming season are for that to change. Ebner is set to be a huge piece of the new Baylor offense. With head coach Dave Aranda and offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes implementing a wide zone offense, the quick and shifty Ebner will get lots of opportunities to get out in the open field and make plays for the

"There is a lot of space in the wide zone, especially if you block it upright," Ebner said. "You can get one-on-one with the safeties and a lot of big plays waiting to happen."

Ebner has shown that if he can get past the second level of a defense, he can cause problems for the opposing team. It's difficult for safeties and corners to make a tackle in open space against the 5-foot-11, 215-pound running back. If all goes according to plan with the offensive scheme, be ready for a lot of breakthrough plays out of the backfield with Ebner taking a handoff. Ebner said he believes the offense is a good fit

Ebner is also a major threat as a kick returner, and he plans to continue this role for the team. With Ebner being a speed threat, he works well with the special teams unit and plans on helping the offense through explosive returns.

"For me, it's just a chance to change the game," Ebner said. "If I can help us cross the 50 [yard line], that just increases our chances of scoring on offense."

Ebner has also been taking leaps as a leader for the team.

"I always looked at him as a leader — a vocal leader," senior running back Abram Smith said. "He's actually improving a lot ... and he's got that kind of influence on the team. The more that he speaks, the more the guys listen to him, the more we go out there and we actually execute."

This is being put on display not only for Ebner's teammates but also for his coaches. The newfound leadership role that Ebner has embraced surprised Aranda.

Aranda said Ebner has grown since last season into a player who has been more vocal during practice in encouraging his teammates. He said during one practice, he was pleased to hear Ebner supporting the team and telling the players to "bring the energy" into practice.

Ebner gives all the credit for his leadership skills to his teammates and coaching staff. The potential was unleashed, and now the locker room has a running back that will be vocal for them all season.

"Coach Aranda and the guys challenged me because I'm not that vocal of a person," Ebner said in a press conference. "I've really been practicing this summer, so I think for getting me outside my comfort zone ... I'm stepping more into a leadership role."

This is the last season for Ebner, who has been with this program since 2017 and has built strong bonds within the team. As the days dwindle down and his final season at Baylor begins, he is staying motivated.

"I know it's the last one," Ebner said. "I just want to take that and work hard every day because it's my last one. I want to enjoy this as much as I can with these guys I've grown to

Ebner is set for a big season. He has been added to the Hornung Watch List and Reese's Senior Bowl Watchlist. Big 12 and nonconference defenses alike will have their hands full trying to contain him, as the Baylor Bears hope to be a big name to look out for during the upcoming season.

Bears emphasize new offensive scheme

"We're an attacking offense that runs a few plays a lot of ways — more misdirection than anybody in the country," senior wide receiver Tyquan Thornton said in a press conference on Aug. 10.

That's the kind of offense new Baylor offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes wants the Bears to have. Coming from Brigham Young University after winning the 2020 Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach, Grimes is known for his belief in the wide zone offensive scheme.

"Coach Grimes, his emphasis on wide zone and the play action is like something I've never seen before," junior quarterback Gerry Bohanon said.

The wide zone scheme is based on horizontal motion by the offensive lineman, allowing him to stretch the field in a certain direction and create gaps for the running backs to read the field.

The wide zone is something that I believe in," Grimes said in a press conference. "I've been fortunate to have been in a lot of different offensive systems, and the wide zone is one that has been the most consistent play in the NFL for the past 20 to 25 years."

Part of the reason Grimes loves the wide zone scheme is that anyone can run it as long as he's "coachable and athletic."

"They don't have to be any specific skill set — just be coachable and willing to execute the play," Grimes said. "It's something that I have really become a believer in and fits with a lot of the things that I like in the passing game as well, so it will be something we hang our hat on."

Last season under Grimes' scheme, BYU

had one of the top offenses in the country. It averaged 43.5 points per game, which was No. 4 in the nation, and 522.2 yards per game, which was No. 6 in the nation. BYU also ranked No. 2 in offensive touchdowns with 68 and No. 1 in yards per play with 7.84. Comparatively, Baylor's offense struggled, ranking No. 118 in the nation in total offense. However, the new offensive approach has the players excited.

"I love this offense ... it stretches everybody out, and off of that, we can get play action passes ... and the receivers just come open from that," sophomore quarterback Jacob Zeno said.

Even with all of the excitement, there are still a few things the veteran players are getting used to.

"I can't tell you the last time I've been in a huddle," senior wide receiver R.J. Sneed said. "I mean, we get in the huddle sometimes during the season, but when the QBs have wristbands on and they say, 'Huddle up,' that's one big change."

With all of the offseason practices and camps, the players have had the chance to gain a better understanding of the offense as a whole. The players have already noticed the difference it has made.

"You can just tell guys' knowledge of the offense is so much better," senior running back Trestan Ebner said. "Even where we left off in the spring — with the studying we did during the summer, the extra workout sessions we did together - everybody's knowledge of the offense is good, so we're able to come in and hit it fast."

All that's left for the Bears to do now is to show that knowledge on Saturdays.



Watch out for that Baylor defense

The Baylor Bears are expected to have another strong defense this upcoming season. On all levels of the field, from the trenches to the secondary, the defense is filled with veterans who are ready to make plays.

Most fans like to talk about the offensive firepower on a team. Scoring, explosive plays and chunk-yard gains tend to be what people get excited over. However, there is a whole other facet of the game that is just as important.

Battle in the Trenches

It all starts with the trenches. Baylor's defensive line is going to be in control of plugging up running holes and applying a consistent pass-rush. Sophomore transfer defensive tackle Siaki "Apu" Ika, who has been with Baylor football head coach Dave

Aranda since their days at Louisiana State University, will be at the center of everything and has a chance to shift the balance of the defensive front in Baylor's favor.

"I think they are going to have to double him or try to cut him," Aranda said. "[In] the 3-4, ... you have your nose in the middle. If two guys have to take him, then you are gaining a number at the point of attack on a play."

"Oh, he's dangerous, senior safety Jalen Pitre said. "I feel like when people get to see him on Saturday, they're going to notice how reckless he is and how much of a game wrecker he is. Him in the middle is going to open a lot of things for a lot of us."

Apu embraces the role and knows how important it is for him to execute on all cylinders for the team.

"I'm built for it," Apu said.
"I'm a pretty large dude. There's not a lot of people that look like me on the team; I'm built to be in the middle. I'm built to

eat up two blocks, make plays when I can - defense is built for me."

Junior defensive lineman Brayden Utley and senior defensive tackle Cole Maxwell will be on the defensive line with Ika, and Ika said he has a lot of confidence in them.

"[They're] fighters," Ika said in a press conference on Aug. 9. "Our strength is in our numbers. We had some dudes come back from injury, so just having them back, being able to go through practice together, makes us better as a unit."

Soldifying the Middle

The linebacker group is filled with experienced players in senior Ashton Logan, junior Dillon Doyle, Bernard and Pitre, who also plays safety. Bernard is coming off a shoulder injury, reuniting on the inside with Doyle.

"It is definitely nice to have Terrell back there with me," Doyle said. "I love playing with 2 [Bernard]. He is just an awesome leader."

Senior running back Abram Smith, who converted from being a linebacker, also spoke about how important Bernard and the linebacker core will be for this team.

"Those guys are the standard," Smith said. "You look at Terrell and you're like, 'Man, he knows what he's doing all the time ... at a high level, high speed.' So, it's like that's what you want out of a football player."

Locking Down the Outside

Headed back to the secondary, another veteran group is looking to lock down opposing receivers and control the aerial attack. Senior cornerbacks Raleigh Texada and Kalon Barnes will be shadowing opposing receivers, while senior safeties JT Woods, Christian Morgan and Pitre

will be helping them out.

The cornerbacks are referenced as "lock-down corners" and are expected to slow down receiver threats from opposing teams. Safeties Woods and Morgan both expressed how much easier their job is due to the quality of talent at the cornerback position.

"All the corners are really good ... you can do a lot of stuff with safeties," Morgan said. "You can change the coverage, you can leave them on an island, and that just frees up us on the back end to make plays. It's really good to have guys like that."

"They have tremendous athletes in that corners room," Woods said. "We all know they have a lot of speed, so I don't have to worry about if I have to leave them on an island. 'Texada Island' - that's a real thing out there. It's no joke. Being able to trust those guys ... to make plays and not always have to worry about protecting them over the top

is really relieving for me as a safety."

Having those types of cornerbacks allows for Aranda and defensive coordinator Ron Roberts to have more flexibility in their defensive play calling.

Woods and Morgan will have plenty of space to make plays and less pressure will be put on their shoulders to aid the cornerbacks in one-on-one situations. In obvious passing situations, having them over the top will be important, but in games where a team is more run-heavy, having the ability to bring them in to blitz will be a bonus.

Overall, the defense is an experienced group that has seen it all and they will look to make use of that this season. Winning is dependent on putting points on the board, make no mistake. However, at the end of the day, it starts with the Baylor Bear defense, which seems ready to get the job done.

While there have been some changes within the Baylor football team going into this season, such as a new starting quarterback, transfer players joining and new coaches, one position has remained the same. The senior wide receiver trio R.J. Sneed, Tyquan Thornton and Josh Fleeks returned to Baylor this season, giving the Bears some veteran experience at the position. Sneed said this is a good thing.

"It's good to have guys that have at least played a little lick of football," Sneed said in a press conference on Aug. 10.

The trio compounded 76 receptions for 836 yards and five touchdowns last season in what was a disappointing 2-7 season for the Bears. They look to improve upon those numbers this season under new offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes and show what they're

Thornton said the wide receivers have been coming in every day in the offseason to

work and get each other better

and the dedication has been noticed by their teammates.

"Those guys are moving around fast," senior safety

Jalen Pitre said in a press conference on Aug. 6. "This first day, one-onones was hard for me because those receivers - I feel like they're the best in the nation. They're coming out and they're taking their craft really seriously. I saw it in the summer; they were here putting in extra hours and I definitely think it's going to pay off for them coming forward."

The preparation has also excited the quarterbacks heading into the season, because they've seen the receivers' ability to make plays.

"I love them," sophomore quarterback Jacob Zeno said in a press conference on Aug. 7. "They're some dogs. Wherever you put the ball at, they're going to go get it. I can pick anybody and I know I can count on them to do their job."

Baylor offensive line ready to bounce back

Baylor's offensive line had a tough season last year, including constant injuries and players having to miss games that were detrimental to their success as a unit. This has unfortunately been a trend for the Bears over recent years, typically ranking in the lower half of the conference. However, with new offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes, new offensive line coach Eric Mateos, returning senior offensive lineman Connor Galvin as well as transfers, the offensive line is looking to have their best season in recent years.

"After last year, 2-7, we've all addressed it, we've all learned from it," Galvin said. "So now it's just about playing as one and playing hard for each other as a team."

A big reason for their improvements has been new offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes and new offensive line coach Eric Mateos. Grimes comes to Baylor from Brigham Young University after winning the 2020 Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach. Mateos also comes from BYU, where he coached the very successful offensive line that was the backbone of their elite offense in 2019-2020. Players and coaches have had nothing but praise for the two new coaches and really believe in them.

"Coach [Grimes] has got a great hold on those guys," Aranda said. "They believe in him and listen to him."

"I can feel the energy and charisma that Coach Mateos injects into these guys' veins every single day," senior offensive lineman Grant Miller said.

"I'm a big fan of the offensive scheme," senior

offensive lineman Jacob Gall said. "It's one of the reasons why I came here."

New personnel for the offensive line have been bright spots for the unit. Transfers Miller and Gall have been working hard and each has said their transitions have been going well and they have enjoyed their time so far. Miller also said it has been his desire for a long time to play for Baylor, since multiple family members have attended and played for the Bears.

"I'm really ready to play whatever it is," Miller said. "I'm just really excited to put on the green and gold for the first game."

Galvin has been a leader for the team and has helped new transfers transition this offseason. Galvin has been a consistent starter at left tackle in his time at Baylor and was selected to the 2020 preseason All-Big 12 second team. Galvin said the offensive line is "all here as one" and believes in the unit and the improvements they have made day in and day out, which will determine the offense's success this season.

"Our package is completely built upon the offensive line," Aranda said. "I think to be the team we need to be, we have to be big-men driven."

sitting back and getting to listen to him talk, and he can go on and on about plays that happened years and years ago. Just being able to talk about that, and me being able to understand it too, is really, really amazing."

However, it isn't always about football with Aranda. One of his biggest points is teaching players that they're more than athletes.

"He's taught me a lot," senior safety Jalen Pitre said. "I think the biggest thing he's taught me is just the whole 'person over player' thing. Just knowing that I do play football, but I'm not necessarily a football player; it's what I do, but it's not who I am. He's always big on that, and he's always looking after football into the future. He's a long-term type of guy, and I think that's definitely going to help all of us in the future."

The extra time has also given the players a chance to get to know their head coach better.

"The players probably have a better understanding of what I'm talking about," Aranda said. "[I'm] not talking as much because a lot of times, if the relationship is right, it may just be a look and they get it."

So far, the players have been liking what they've seen from Aranda in his second year.

"I think he's been doing an amazing job," Woods said in a press conference. "He's been listening to us. He's been tailoring things toward us. He's really opened up his shell a lot. When he first got here — at least to me it was kind of like he was closed off, but he's definitely bloomed, and I just love seeing him

grow each and every day as a head coach."

The lifting of restrictions has given Aranda more practice time. With spring camp, summer workouts and fall camp, Aranda has had ample time to instill his philosophy of mastering the simple things in his players.

"It's spending the time on individual and fundamental work and getting to the spot where you can do simple better and getting people to have ownership of those things," Aranda said. "To do it when it matters, to do it when it's tough, that is when there's a mastery

According to Pitre, the players have all adopted that mindset.

"It's wonderful," Pitre said. "It's good to be out here with my teammates. Last year, we didn't have spring ball, so definitely coming in I see the preparation that we put in and I think it's paying off, especially in the weight room and even on the field and in the meetings. Our team is gelling. I think we're headed in the right direction."

The point of spending so much extra time together this offseason is to build a strong culture of unity and brotherhood, which wasn't always evident last year.

"We have an offense and defense that plays together," senior wide receiver Tyquan Thornton said in a press conference. "We come to work every day to make each other better. It's not me versus you out there; it's me with you, and that's the culture we're trying to build here at Baylor."

Bohanon's confidence has grown during his career. He spoke on this multiple times during his press conference, and he appears to be very level-headed during tough situations. The more he takes the field in games and practice, the more comfortable he becomes in

"Getting more and more reps, some confidence is going to build with knowing what you're doing," Bohanon said. "I've built my confidence up and grown as a player and

Bohanon did not get much playing time last season, but the season prior, he contributed a lot in his role as QB2. He threw two passing touchdowns and had 272 rushing yards for three rushing touchdowns.

"I'm coming in here every day just focused on learning more and more," Bohanon said.

Bohanon gets it done both on and off the field. He has been named to the First Team Academic All-Big 12 for the past two seasons.

He said he loves picking the brains of his coaches and spoke on a specific meeting when he sat down with Aranda to talk coverages and

"He has a great appetite for football, and you could not feed him enough," Aranda said. "As far as learning goes ... Gerry's been able to connect the dots and take whatever information he has and then apply it and then teach others."

Bohanon said he takes all of Aranda's coaching to heart and learns from it.

"He [Aranda] knows so much; it is unbelievable," Bohanon said, "I was just in there writing everything down."

With a new offensive scheme from new offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes, as well as a potential bounceback season from the offensive line, Bohanon has prepared himself have a breakout season and lead the Bears to a possible bowl game.
